


Our population is ageing




The populations of these ethnic groups have all risen



The proportion of White British people now makes up 90.2% of the population. A reduction of 3.3% since 2011




More of us are experiencing a physical or mental health condition or illness


Gender identity

Around 693,000 people selected 'straight or hetrosexual' and 55,000 did not answer. The remaining questions were answered as:



How we live has changed

Less of us are owning our own homes. More of us are renting than ever.

Owned 63.6%

A scarcity of social accommodation is pushing more people into the private rented sector.

More of us are living alone

Older adults* living alone now account for around 1 in 7 households (14.3%)

The government advice at the time was for people to work from home (if they could) and avoid public transport

Since 2021 working patterns continue to evolve, with hybrid work spaces becoming more commonplace



Population summary

- Our total population has grown by 2.0% and is now almost 935,875 people. The national increase was 6.6%.
- The 55+ population has gone up by 16.6%. That's an extra 47,200 people. The national increase was 17.8%

Demographic summary

- Gender remains fairly evenly split, 49% male and 51% female. This is the same nationally
- Around 4 in 10 of our population (40.5%) are in lower socio economic groups (NS SeC 6-8), compared to 3 in 10 (31.8%) nationally
- Our population is now more ethnically diverse. Black, Mixed and White Other ethnic groups have seen the biggest growth locally. This reflects the national ethnic change
- 42.2% of our population are classed as economically inactive (compared to 39.1% nationally). The majority of these are retired (25.7%). This is higher than national (21.5%) and has grown at a faster rate (1.5% increase locally, 0.3% nationally)
- 1 in 7 of our older adults (65+) are living alone, compared to 1 in 8 nationally
- 7.1% of all our households are lone parents living with dependent children. This is the same nationally
- 18.4% of people are now working from home, compared to 31.5% nationally
